While telehealth has expanded access to medical care, it does **not** remove the legal requirements for prescribing and dispensing controlled substances.

What Oxycodone Is Used For

Oxycodone may be prescribed for:

- Severe acute pain (e.g., post-operative pain)
- Cancer-related pain
- Certain chronic pain conditions when other therapies are insufficient
- Pain requiring around-the-clock management (extended-release forms)

It works by binding to opioid receptors in the brain and spinal cord to reduce pain perception.

Why It's Strictly Regulated

Oxycodone is classified as a **Schedule II controlled substance** because it:

- The patient receives counseling on safe use.
